Fiscal Year 2021/22 Budget Approved

The City Council recently approved the Fiscal Year 2021-2022 budget ("FY 2022 budget"), together with the City's five (5) year Capital Improvement Plan document ("CIP"). The City remains optimistic that the local economy will continue to show signs of improvement over the coming year as we enter into Restore Illinois Phase Five (5). The FY 2022 budget will continue to be impacted by the coronavirus pandemic with reduced revenues for amusement taxes and hotel taxes, which are two (2) of the hardest hit industries namely, entertainment and tourism. In an effort to reduce costs, the City eliminated several administrative positions saving the City approximately \$253,000 in annual salary and benefit costs. In FY 2022, the City anticipates the receipt of about \$129,500 in grant funds through the American Rescue Plan Act. The City will continue to look to grant funding, when available.

The City maintains four (4) funds: General Fund, Motor Fuel Tax Fund, Capital Improvement Fund, and the Water Fund.

General Fund

For this year, the City Council approved a balanced General Fund budget with revenues of \$10,713,117 and expenditures of \$10,385.053. The General Fund is the City's main operating fund and provides most of the services provided to residents, such as general administration, police protection, code enforcement, grounds maintenance, special events, storm water management, and street maintenance. The major revenue sources in the General Fund include: the local share of State sales taxes, the local hotel/motel tax, property taxes, and police fines. Public safety expenses comprise the largest portion at 55% of the General Fund's expenses at \$7,312,315.

Water Fund

The Water Fund is comprised of two (2) components – Operations and Maintenance (O&M), and Distribution. O&M pays for the costs to operate and maintain the water system, while Distribution pays for capital improvements to the water system and related expenditures.

For the FY 2022 budget, Water Fund revenues are estimated at \$1.2 million, and expenses are budgeted at \$1.3 million, almost breaking even. The

Fiscal Year 2021/22 Budget continued

DuPage Water Commission charges represent the largest expense at \$445,000 or 33% of the total budget. The DuPage Water Commission supplies Lake Michigan water, which is then distributed through the City's water infrastructure to each utility customer.

Motor Fuel Tax Fund

Motor Fuel Tax collections for the FY 2022 budget will be used to fund two (2) programs: the City's allotment of road salt and snow plowing related charges.

Capital Improvement Fund

Although the local economy is improving, the City Council continued to place capital projects on hold except for the Streambank Stabilization project and the new squad equipment. Some of the streambanks are severely eroded due to the recent heavy rainfalls. The proposed streambank stabilization project will shore up the creek banks. This project is estimated to cost about \$971,000 and the City was awarded a \$234,000 grant from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to offset a portion of this expense.

Since FY 2013, the City prioritized the replacement of major equipment, infrastructure, and facilities with existing revenues and without issuing debt, saving the City millions in interest costs. To take a step back for an additional year will restore funding for future improvements.

For the past 13 years, the City received the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award.

Garbage Cans

Under the City municipal code, garbage cans may not be placed on the parkway 24 hours before the scheduled pick-up day, and containers must be removed from the parkway within 12 hours after pick up.

Contractor Registration

All general contractors and sub-contractors performing work in the City, for both residential and commercial projects, are required to register with the City prior to permit release. Registration forms are available at the City Hall Building and Zoning Department or can be downloaded from the City website at www.oakbrookterrace.net.

Solar Panels

Solar panels have grown in popularity as an affordable,

reliable, clean and smart way to power your home. The City of Oakbrook Terrace has adopted an ordinance approving the installation of rooftop solar panels within the single-family detached zoning district. If you are interested in installing solar panels, contact the Building and Zoning Department for permitting requirements.

Solar Energy for your Home

When shopping for the right solar system, two key terms to keep in mind are "Off-Grid" and "On-Grid."

Off-Grid Solar Systems

- Are designed for the power needs of mid-to-large homes.
- Have no connection to the utility grid and must make all the electricity necessary to power your home.
- Allow you to store and save your solar power in batteries for use when the power grid goes down.
- Is meant to be entirely self-sustaining.
- Requires more maintenance and is more expensive to install.

On-Grid Solar Systems

- Sends the excess power generated to the utility grid when you are overproducing.
- Is most cost-effective and simplest to install.
- Connects to a utility company.
- Has no batteries to maintain, so it is maintenance free.
- Has no backup power, which is a downside.

Weather is a concern with any solar system. Several cloudy days in a row could cause the lights to go out. That will depend on how big of a system you have. A bigger system could last a week to 10 days. A smaller system could only run a couple of days without sunshine.

A typical residential solar electricity system lasts roughly 20 years; however, a well maintained system will last much longer. Check and compare the performance warranty with each company before making a final decision.

Batteries are the biggest maintenance concern. Lead acid batteries typically last five to 12 years, whereas a lithium battery can last 25 years or more.

Regular maintenance inspections should be performed on both systems to ensure all components are functioning and no connections are loose. In some cases, the system can be monitored online for easy troubleshooting.

Solar systems can also be expanded if demand increases, or if the homeowner finds they underestimated their usage.

Cost of a residential solar system depends on need, the size of the project, whether it is Off-Grid or On-Grid and the type of batteries used. Homeowners are strongly encouraged to do their homework and shop around for the best option that fits their needs.

Spring has sprung! The last of the winter weather is clearing up, temperatures are getting warmer, and the trees are blooming. You are looking forward to getting out of the house more often, which means you need to consider how secure your home is when you're away. We've put together some important spring home security tips to consider.

Fix Your Fencing

The cold, rough winter weather can do a number on your fencing. Your fence may have cracked or shifted in response to the freezing ground. This spring, you should walk the perimeter of your yard and carefully check your fencing. Fences that look fragile, broken, or saggy are targets for potential robbers. They can spot the weakness in the fence line and use it to gain access to your backyard, where they'll be out of sight.

Lock Your Shed and Garage

Once spring hits, it is time to start gardening and working on the lawn. It's easy to leave the garage or shed open while you're mowing the lawn or tilling the garden, but doing so allows people to see inside. They can find other points of access and will notice what types of valuable equipment you store inside. Be sure to close and lock the shed and garage after each use. Don't leave tools or equipment out on the lawn for easy taking.

Make the Most of Spring Cleaning

It seems inevitable that during the winter you'll accumulate more stuff than you need. Spring cleaning is a great excuse to clear the clutter. It also gives you an opportunity to go through your valuable items and keep a record of what you own—start a log, jot down serial numbers, and take photos. While you're at it, change the batteries in your smoke detector and your carbon monoxide detector.

Clean Outside Lighting

The cold weather mixed with winter precipitation can leave a dingy film on lights exposed to the elements. When spring comes, make sure to clean your outside lights so they are as bright as possible. While you're doing that, take the time to assess how bright your yard appears at night. Adding lights along the walkway, hedges, and at the base of trees can beautify and protect your home.

Maintain Your Yard

Mowing the yard can be an arduous task, especially if you have a large, lush lawn. But keeping up your yard's appearance can be an important security measure. Yards that look disheveled and uncared for can be signals to potential robbers that no one is home. If no one appears to be maintaining the yard, it might be because no one lives there regularly. Deter burglars by keeping your yard looking beautiful.

Plan For Vacation

Maybe you've got a spring break trip planned, or you're already starting to put summer getaways on the calendar. No matter what the reason, if you're planning to go out of town, make sure your home is ready. Set inside and outside lights on a timer, ask a reliable neighbor to keep watch over your home, and don't advertise your trip on social media. Grass Height Reminder

Oakbrook Terrace municipal code requires that lawns be maintained at a height of six inches or less. Please help keep our community neat and attractive by regularly mowing and maintaining your property.

Oakbrook Terrace Private Security Camera Rebate Program

The City of Oakbrook Terrace offers a Private Security Camera Rebate Program for residents of owner-occupied, detached, singlefamily homes and detached townhomes located within the City where the property is used as the owner's primary residence. The program provides a rebate of up to \$150 per camera system per residential address. The rebate is exclusively for the cost of the security camera(s) and installation, including any applicable taxes. Rebates will only be given for cameras that are installed on the exterior of the property and for the amount that was paid at the time of application. For information, visit oakbrookterrace.net.

Villa Park Library Card

As of May 1, 2021, the annual fee for a Villa Park library card is \$44 per multi-family household (living in apartments such as Versailles and Regency Place) and \$54 per single-family household (including Spring Club, Berkshire and Arbor 40, as well as all other single-family households) through April 30, 2022. The library card provides access to all of the library's resources. For more information, please visit www.villapark.lib.il.us/.

Water Bill Payments

The City accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover for payment of water bills. In addition, there are other ways to pay your Oakbrook Terrace water bill: have it debited automatically from your checking account, mail it in, or drop your payment into the convenient drop-box located at the Butterfield Road entrance to City Hall. You can also now pay your water bill over the phone with a credit card by calling. 630-941-8300, ext. 242, or pay online by visiting www.oakbrookterrace.net. If paying by mail, please send it no less than five mailing days before the due date to avoid a penalty for late payment.
