












A Little Bit of History

Power Up Your Home (Art) with Community Solar

With the popularity of solar panels growing, the city has seen a number of residences take advantage of solar energy as an alternative to power their home. In our last issue of Terrace Leaves, we explained the difference between an Off-Grid and "On-Grid" solar system, and we now are taking a closer look at another option known as Community Solar Farms.

What is Community Solar? Community solar refers to a local solar facility shared by individual community members who receive credits on their electricity bills for their portion of the power produced. A community solar farm is designed to make the many advantages of solar power accessible to anyone. Community solar farms are typically built on an open parcel of land and feature thousands of solar panels all interconnected and generating clean energy that is fed directly to the local utility grid. Once a solar farm is complete, it begins sending clean energy to the local grid. A homeowner will still get their power the same way as always, from the existing power lines through the local utility company. The benefit is that the local grid now has a new, clean, carbon-free source of energy in the mix, helping to reduce emissions and enable the shift toward a cleaner energy future. A homeowner benefits from the value of the energy while actively supporting the growth of much-needed clean energy on the grid.

There are several reasons why rooftop solar panels are not an option for everyone: You do not own the home you reside in or you live in a multi-family unit; you do not have a suitable roof, or the location of your home does not receive sufficient sunlight; you do not have the money to invest up front or simply you do not like the look of the panels. Yet you still want the benefits of solar energy, which include cost savings and a reduced environmental footprint. Within the last few years, community solar programs have become an option.

How community solar works:

- A homeowner enrolls in a local community solar farm.
- The solar farm sends clean energy directly to the grid.
- The homeowner receives a share of the value applied as a credit to their utility bill.
- The community solar provider bills for the credit at a fixed discount.

Some Interesting Facts

REI, Recreational Equipment, Inc, located at 17W160 22nd Street has been in business at their Oakbrook Terrace location for about 26 years and recently completed the installation of a solar panel system on 85% of the store's rooftop. They recognize that generating their own electricity through outside solar rays provides free zero carbon energy for years to come. They hope to inspire other businesses to do the same moving forward in the future.

Grass Height & Property Maintenance

Oakbrook Terrace municipal code requires that lawns be maintained at a height of six inches or less and property owners are encouraged to maintain clean, sanitary, and safe conditions for their entire premises.

Lake Michigan Water Facts

The Great Lakes were formed when the glaciers cut through the surface of the earth and melted. This created the largest source of fresh water on the face of the planet.

Even though Lake Michigan is the largest lake in the United States, it is only the third largest of the Great Lakes (Lake Superior is the largest) and the fifth largest lake in the world.

Lake Michigan is 923 feet deep at its deepest point and 307 miles long and 118 miles wide at its widest point. It is the only Great Lake to lie completely within the boundaries of the United Sates. Lake Michigan contains so much water that more than 320,000 gallons evaporate off of the Lake every second!

Lake Michigan is so big that more than 400,000 gallons of rain or snow land on the lake every second!

Protect Your Family When Seconds Count – Register for Smart911!

What is Smart911?

Smart911 is a free public safety service that helps first responders help you more quickly when you dial 911. You create an electronic safety profile that provides essential household information about family members, home, pets and vehicles.

This information will display automatically on the 911 call taker's screen when you make an emergency call. It's private and secure, and you control what information is in your profile. Smart911 is offered by the Emergency Telephone System Board of DuPage County and is supported by existing 911 fees.

How does Smart911 help?

Detailed profiles can save valuable time during an emergency. Some examples:

Mobile phones: Approximately 73% of 911 calls come from mobile phones – but a cellular telephone's exact location can't always be determined by GPS from a cell tower. Smart911's enhanced service displays the listed address of the mobile phone in the profile and can track the call via GPS, even if the call is disconnected.

Missing children: It can take up to an hour to acquire a current photo of a child and disseminate it. Smart911 profiles will display the user-provided photo of the child, which can be immediately saved or forwarded to officers in the field or news channels.

Unresponsive callers: Callers may not be able to speak because they are unconscious, have a speech condition or be in a situation where it is dangerous to speak. A Smart911 profile can display medical information so that first responders know about existing medical conditions and how to treat them. A profile can also list caregiver contact information.

House fire: The Smart911 profile will list family members, photos, room locations, and even pets to assist fire fighters in

quickly locating all members and rescuing them safely.

What information can be included?

Anything you think could be useful, including:

- Family members' ages, photos or physical descriptions
- Information about your home, including address, utility shutoff valves and keyholders
- Medical information, such as medications, medical conditions or disabilities
- Special considerations like language restrictions, restraining orders or rescue notes

Who can use Smart911?

Anyone who lives, works or visits DuPage County can create a profile. It's free, and the information provided is available only to emergency responders during a 911 call. DuPage first responders encourage participants in the State of Illinois Premise Alert Program (PAP) to also complete profiles.

How do you sign up?

Visit www.smart911.com to create a profile. The step-by-step online process lets you decide which information you want to include on your profile – and you can update or change it at any time.

Stay Connected To Your Town

Oakbrook Terrace Private Security Camera Rebate Program

The City of Oakbrook Terrace offers a Private Security Camera Rebate Program for residents of owner-occupied, detached, single-family homes and detached townhomes located within the City where the property is used as the owner's primary residence. The program provides a rebate of up to \$150 per camera system per residential address. The rebate is exclusively for the cost of the security camera(s) and installation, including any applicable taxes. Rebates will only be given for cameras that are installed on the exterior of the property and for the amount that was paid at the time of application. For information, visit oakbrookterrace.net.

Villa Park Library Card

As of May 1, 2021, the annual fee for a Villa Park library card is \$44 per multi-family household (living in apartments such as Versailles and Regency Place) and \$54 per single-family household (including Spring Club, Berkshire and Arbor 40, as well as all other single-family households) through April 30, 2022. The library card provides access to all of the library's resources. For more information, please visit www.villapark.lib.il.us/.

Water Bill Payments

The City accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover for payment of water bills. In addition, there are other ways to pay your Oakbrook Terrace water bill: have it debited automatically from your checking account, mail it in, or drop your payment into the convenient drop-box located at the Butterfield Road entrance to City Hall. You can also now pay your water bill over the phone with a credit card by calling. 630-941-8300, ext. 242, or pay online by visiting www.oakbrookterrace.net. If paying by mail, please send it no less than five mailing days before the due date to avoid a penalty for late payment. Please note that water bills are now mailed to residents on a bi-monthly basis. IF YOU ARE MOVING, please call City Hall at 630-941-8300, ext. 242, to schedule a final reading.
