Mammoth Spring



The Oakbrook Terrace
Historical Society recently
restored and reinstalled
the missing historical
marker for the nearby
Mammoth Spring that was
located at the Double Tree
Hotel near Spring Road
and Harger Road in Oak
Brook. Spring Road runs
North and South between

Oakbrook Terrace and Oak Brook. It was brought to the attention of our Historical Society by a local resident that the historical marker was missing. This had also been reported on The Historical Marker Database website (HMdb.org).

The Mammoth Spring was a water spring. It was used from 1861 to the early 20th century. It burst open suddenly in 1861 on the Talmadge family farm and was used until 1889 for irrigation. Around 1874, Mammoth Spring was described as "located in the highway, between lands owned by G.H. Talmadge and Robert Reed." The road is named Spring Road because of the wooden conduit extending along the road from the spring. The wooden conduit was constructed in 1889, and operated from 1889 to 1916 before being depleted. The spring supplied all the water for nearby Elmhurst (including supplying the source water for the Elmhurst Spring Water Company) and some water for Oak Brook (including supplying the source water for the Mammoth Spring Ice Company).

Eventually artificial ice replaced natural ice, after which the Mammoth Springs Ice Company was sold in 1910. The City of Elmhurst took over the water supply from the Elmhurst Spring Water Company in 1916 and drilled its own wells. Mammoth Spring was abandoned as a water source for Elmhurst sometime between 1918 and 1927. The spring's original trough was destroyed when Spring Road was widened in 1979. Elmhurst Historical Museum has a piece of the old trough on display.

The Marker Reads:

MAMMOTH SPRING

"Largest in northeastern Illinois, burst forth in 1861 and was used for domestic and irrigation purposes pumping 150 gallons



per minute, furnished through a wood conduit supplying the total water supply for Elmhurst from 1889-1916. The original trough remained until 1970." Erected by: Elmhurst Historical Society & Oak Brook Historical Society.

Residential Rental Licensing

The City of Oakbrook Terrace requires all residential rental properties to be licensed and inspected yearly. The purpose of the licensing

and inspection of residential rental properties is to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City. The City ordinance ensures that rental properties comply with the minimum housing standards, along with maintaining and improving the character and stability of residential areas. Inspections also correct and prevent housing conditions that adversely affect, or are likely to affect the welfare of persons occupying the dwellings. The City of Oakbrook Terrace also seeks to eliminate overcrowding of dwellings by requiring compliance with established occupancy standards.

All owners of a rental property within the City of Oakbrook Terrace must obtain a yearly license. Applications will be mailed to all property owners on file with the City by the end of April, or the application is available online at oakbrookterrace.net. The completed application with the required fee and support documents is due by May 1 and must be submitted to the City before a rental inspection is scheduled.

Ordinance No. 16-9, dated February 9, 2016, is available for viewing on the City's website.



Pedestrian Safety

With the warm days approaching, please take some time and review the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration recommendations below to help keep pedestrians safe. And remember to be extra vigilant when children are out.

Tips for Motorists

- Look out for pedestrians everywhere, at all times.
- Use extra caution when driving in hard-to-see conditions, such as nighttime or bad weather.
- Slow down and be prepared to stop when turning or otherwise entering a crosswalk.

- Never pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk. There may be people crossing who you can't see.
- Be extra cautious when backing up and look for pedestrians.

Tips for Pedestrians

- Follow the rules of the road and obey signs and signals.
- Walk on sidewalks whenever they are available.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic and as far from traffic as possible.
- Cross streets at crosswalks or intersections. Look for cars in all directions, including those turning left or right.
- Watch for cars entering or exiting driveways or backing up in parking lots.

Butterfield Road Resurfacing Project

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has notified Public Services Director Craig Ward that they are scheduled to begin a road resurfacing project on Butterfield Rd from Route 59 to York Rd. The project is slated to begin this spring and will last for approximately 18 months, with daily daytime lane closures taking place when the project begins.

2025 Brush Pick-Up Dates

Brush pick-ups will take place on Mondays on the following dates:

April 7 and 28 May 12 June 2 and 23 July 14 August 4 and 25 September 15

October 6 and 27

Acceptable Brush

- Tree trimming up to 6 inches in diameter.
- Mounded less than 4 feet high and ends toward the street.
- Only brush generated by Oakbrook Terrace residents accepted.

Rules for Smooth Pickups

- There will be one pass down each street on each of the designated dates listed above.
- Residents may place brush at the curb on the weekend prior to brush pickup day. To dispose of brush between monthly pickups, use the weekly yard waste program provided by the City's waste hauler, Flood Brothers.

Oakbrook Terrace Pet Regulations

All dogs and cats residing in Oakbrook Terrace must be vaccinated for rabies and owners must have a rabies vaccination tag, typically provided by the veterinarian at the time of the vaccination. In addition, City ordinance requires that pets be leashed when not enclosed on their own property. As a courtesy, please respect your neighbors and clean up after your pet and do not let your pet run on the property of others. To help protect your pet in the event that it is lost, you may register it with the Oakbrook Terrace Police Department with your contact information, needed information about the pet and your pet's photo.

Garbage and Recycling Containers Regulations

Under the City municipal code, "It shall be unlawful for a customer to place white goods or containers for general refuse, landscape waste and recyclable materials on any public right-of-way for pick-up before 6:00 p.m. on the day before the scheduled collection day, and to fail to remove such containers from the roadway shoulder before 10:00 p.m. on the day of collection. Garbage and recycling containers should be stored inside the garage, behind the home or on the side of the home and must not be visible from the street." The City asks for your cooperation in abiding by these guidelines.

Villa Park Library Card

As of May 1, 2025, library cards are a flat \$20 to all residents through April 30, 2026. The library card provides access to all of the library's resources. For more information, please visit www.villapark.lib.il.us/.

Water Bill Payments

The City accepts Visa, MasterCard, American Express, and Discover for payment of water bills. In addition, there are other ways to pay your Oakbrook Terrace water bill: have it debited automatically from your checking account, mail it in, or drop your payment into the convenient drop-box located at the Butterfield Road entrance to City Hall. You can also now pay your water bill over the phone with a credit card by calling. 630-941-8300, ext. 242, or pay online by visiting www.oakbrookterrace. net. If paying by mail, please send it no less than five mailing days before the due date to avoid a penalty for late payment. Please note that water bills are mailed to residents on a bi-monthly basis. IF YOU ARE MOVING, please call City Hall at 630-941-8300, ext. 242, to schedule a final reading.
