## The Census is Coming

### Much more than a headcount

Watch for a postcard from the U.S. Census in early March 2020. It is very important that every member of our community is counted for many reasons and possibly most importantly, federal and state funds flow to our City based on our population count. Every individual counted in the U.S. Census is worth approximately \$1,700 per year in funds that can come to the community. It also provides a picture of our nation that helps determine where to build new schools, hospitals, and businesses and how congressional seats are apportioned.

Once every decade, the federal government conducts a census of the entire population to count everyone in the U.S. and record basic information about them.

In 2020, for the first time ever, the U.S. Census Bureau will accept responses online, but you can still respond by phone or mail if you prefer. Confidential and Secure Strict federal law protects your census responses. It is against the law for any Census Bureau employee to disclose or publish any census information that identifies an individual or business. Census Bureau employees take a lifelong pledge of confidentiality to handle data responsibly and keep respondents' information private. The penalty for wrongful disclosure is a fine of up to \$250,000 or imprisonment for up to five years, or both. No law enforcement agency (not the DHS, ICE, FBI, or CIA) can access or use your personal information at any time. Data collected can only be used for statistical purposes that helps inform important decisions, including how much federal funding your community receives. The Census Bureau will never ask for your Social Security number, bank or credit card account numbers, money or donations, or anything on behalf of a political party. The Census Bureau has a robust cybersecurity program that incorporates industry best practices and federal security standards for encrypting data. ### **Election Judges Needed**

The DuPage County Clerk's Election Division is actively looking for Election Judges for the upcoming March 17, 2020 election. Election Judges and Student Judges are the backbone of the election process and their efforts are much valued and appreciated!

Judges of election are responsible for the administration of election procedures in the polling place on Election Day and are in the position of ensuring that the election process is administered fairly and in accordance with the law

Election Judges are paid for the day and additional payment is available for attending training class(es) as long the Judge serves on Election Day.

Qualifications are be a citizen of the United States; be of good repute; be able to speak, read, and write the English language; be skilled in the four fundamental rules of mathematics; be of good understanding and capable character; reside in and be entitled to vote in the county; and not subject to the registration requirement of the Sex Offender Registration Act; not be a candidate for any office in the election and not be elected committeeman. Additionally, Student Judges are welcomed, with a few more criteria, as outlined on their application.





## Home Safety.

**Fireplace Safety** - As you relax in front of your fireplace the last thing you are likely to be thinking about is the condition of your chimney or if the liner is intact. Before you light those winter fires, we encourage you to have your fireplace cleaned and inspected. Dirty chimneys can cause chimney fires, which damage structures and destroy homes and property. Indications of a chimney fire have been described as loud cracking and popping noises with a lot of dense smoke, and an intense odor. Fireplaces and vents should be inspected at least once a year for soundness, freedom from deposits and correct clearances. Cleaning, maintenance, and repairs should be done if necessary. Even if you don't use your chimney much, animals may build nests in the flue or there may be other types of deterioration that could make the chimney unsafe to use.

Dryer Vent Safety – When was the last time you had your dryer vent cleaned? Lint and debris can build up in your clothes dryer duct causing your dryer to work overtime, creating potentially hazardous conditions, including dangerous levels of carbon monoxide in your home or even a fire. Clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry and remove lint that has collected around the drum. Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. If you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you.

## Building & Zoning

Several projects are currently underway or slated to begin throughout Oakbrook Terrace.

The German industrial giant Bosch has secured a lease for around 110,000 square feet of office space over four floors within the Oakbrook Terrace Tower and space within the industrial building on the property. Bosch plans on moving its automotive aftermarket division, consisting of roughly 350 employees, from its Broadview location to Oakbrook Terrace in the spring of 2020.

Gold and Oaks Title Services, a full service real estate closing facility will be opening an office at 17W418 22nd Street within the JRC Plaza.

Work is progressing on the full scale renovations of the former LaQuinta hotel now known as Choice Hotel / Mainstay Suites and Sleep Inn located at 17W710 22nd Street directly east of the Home Depot on 22nd Street. Updates include exterior styling enhancements of the building and full interior updates including added hospitality and business center amenities.

Site development has been completed at 18W080 22nd Street on the north side of 22nd Street and construction of the building shell for the new Lou Malnati's Pizza is now underway. Lou Malnati's is expected to open in the spring of 2020.

Lakeside Bank, a locally owned, community-oriented bank that has been serving the area since 1966, will be adding another building to its portfolio with the construction of a new building at 18W078 22nd Street along the north side of 22nd Street. This location will offer personalized banking services tailored to each individual and business customers.

## Senior Citizens' Real Estate Tax Deferral Program

he Senior Citizens' Real Estate Tax Deferral program provides tax relief for qualified senior citizens by allowing them to defer \$5,000 of their property tax on their principal residence. Applications are taken January through the cut-off date of March 1 each year. You may also choose to defer payment of special assessment taxes levied by the City or water and sewer district.

The deferral is similar to a loan against the property's market value. The deferred amounts are borrowed from the State of Illinois, who then pays \$5,000 of the current year's tax bill. To ensure repayment, a six percent (6%) simple interest rate is charged on the deferred amounts and a lien is filed on the property.

Deferred amounts must be repaid within one year of the settlement of the estate or at the time the property is sold or title is transferred.

The annual qualifications for the program are:

- Be 65 years old by June 1
- Have a total combined annual household income of no more than \$55,000.00
- Have owned and occupied the property or other qualifying property for at least the last three years
- Have no delinquent property taxes or delinquent special assessments on the property
- Have adequate insurance against fire and casualty loss
- Own the property, or share joint ownership with your spouse, or be the sole beneficiary, or you and your spouse be the sole beneficiaries of a land trust

### **Crime Stoppers**

Did you know you can provide information about criminal activity anonymously? Crime Stoppers enables individuals to furnish crime-solving assistance through a program that offers anonymity. Callers are given a code number rather than being asked for their name. Crime Stoppers also offers rewards for information that leads to felony arrest and/or convictions. ### Villa Park Library Card

Effective May 1, 2019, the cost for a Villa Park Library Card is \$42 per multi-family household (living in apartments such as Versailles and Regency Place) and \$51 per single-family household (including Spring Club, Berkshire and Arbor 40, as well as all other single-family households) through April 30, 2019. The library card provides access to all of the library's resources. Applications for Villa Park library cards are available at Oakbrook Terrace City Hall or the Police Department after hours. ### Water Bill Payments

The City accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover for payment of water bills. In addition, there are other ways to pay your Oakbrook Terrace water bill: have it debited automatically from your checking account, mail it in, or drop your payment into the convenient drop-box located at the Butterfield Road entrance to City Hall. You can also now pay your water bill over the phone with a credit card by calling. 630-941-8300, ext. 242, or pay online by visiting www.oakbrookterrace.net. If paying by mail, please send it no less than five mailing days before the due date to avoid a penalty for late payment.
