#### Winter Home Maintenance Checklist

Lower temperatures mean higher thermostat settings, and higher gas bills in the dead of winter. Check the weather stripping around doors and

windows and replace those that are worn.

✓ **Inspect your heating system** and schedule a furnace tune-up. Don't wait to turn on your furnace. If you have issues, you'll want to know before winter. As a homeowner, you should listen for strange noises, such as booming, clicking, and squealing. Also pay attention to odd odors coming from the furnace. If you notice anything unusual, call an HVAC professional right away.

✓ Perform a visual check of your roof, examining for broken or missing shingles, which can lead to water damage inside. Shingle granules in your gutters is a sign they may need replacement.

**V** If you have a fireplace, fall is a great time to clean your fireplace and give it a thorough cleaning and inspection. Maintaining a clean fireplace is the simplest and best way to remove creosote, a byproduct of wood combustion that contains tar and toxins. This reduces the risk of fire.

✓ It's easy to forget about smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, unless a cooking disaster sets off the alarm. That's why it's a good time to check the batteries in those devices or replace or install additional detectors if needed.

**V** Run ceiling fans in reverse to help circulate warm air near the ceiling back into your living space, which can help cut your heating costs. Make sure the fan is off and then simply flip the switch typically found on the side of the motor.

✓ Aerating your lawn is a great way to help produce a stronger lawn. Once aerated, throw on grass seed or a late-season fertilizer, to help grass retain vital nutrients during the winter.

Contact your irrigation company and have your outdoor irrigation system winterized to prevent damage from freezing water.

✓ Disconnect and empty garden hoses. A frozen hose can cause the water inside the wall to freeze and burst. Disconnect your hose and let it drain on an angle.

Throughout the year, your gutters fill up with leaves, sticks, and other debris. Failing to clear this gunk from your gutters can mean rain and melting snow won't be able to drain easily, potentially causing seepage and leaks into your home.

Clear out flower and vegetable beds. Take a long look at your yard and decide which landscaping elements worked and which didn't. Removing plants is easier when they're in hibernation.

✓ Snails and slugs spend all autumn eating your perennials, but you can stop them by cutting back perennials before the season gets going. By trimming the foliage to the ground it sends energy to the roots for next spring and results in healthier plants.

✓ Get planting. With your flower beds cleared out, fall is actually a great time for planting tulips, daffodils or other spring bulbs.

**Winterize your gardening supplies.** Fix squeaky screws, and de-rust and sharpen any blades to save yourself time come spring. Your local gardening or hardware store might offer a tool sharpening service, but this is also a job you can tackle yourself with a sharpening stone or grinding wheel.

# Public Services

## 2020-21 Driveway Snow Removal Program

The City provides a Private Driveway Snowplowing Program. On behalf of the Mayor and City Council, we welcome your participation in the program for this year if you meet the following requirements. Packets for the Private Driveway Snow Removal Program are available at City Hall for residents to pick up effective October 1, 2020.

- Only residents who cannot shovel snow due to a temporary or permanent disability, regardless of age, are eligible. You must provide a statement from a medical doctor verifying that your disability prevents you from shoveling snow. A copy of an example statement is included in the packet.
- If a resident has a permanent disability that will prevent them from shoveling snow for the foreseeable future, a yearly verification of disability is not required, but an application form does need to be completed on a yearly basis.

# City Salting & Snow Removal Policy

Residents are asked to follow the city's salting and snow removal policies to support efficient removal of snow and ice from local roads while assuring traffic safety.

- The City only plows and salts City streets, dead ends and cul-de-sacs; the only exception is if the City agrees to provide service by contract and is compensated accordingly, or if a handicapped resident resides there who has been approved to participate in the City's private driveway snow removal program (see above).
- The City does not provide snow removal from sidewalks or driveway entrances. The only exception is the driveway snow removal program.
- Snow removal operations follow established snowplow routes, chosen to allow for optimum use of City equipment, manpower and supplies. Snow removal is conducted on City streets and City property only, with the only exception as identified in the private driveway snow removal program.

- If a residence also houses an able-bodied person, besides the disabled resident, the disabled resident will not be eligible.
- If more than one person resides in the house, a doctor's note will be required for each individual stating that they are disabled.
- A seasonal charge of \$50.00 is required prior to the start of the program. This charge covers all winter plowing, no matter how many snowstorms occur. There will be no refunds of this fee if there is little or no snow this year and plowing is not required.
- This program is for removal of snow on driveways only, not sidewalks.
- You must sign the waiver of liability that is provided in the packet and return it to the City.

Participants should be aware that driveway clearing will only take place after a snowfall of two inches or more and driveways will be cleared after all streets and public facilities have been done.

• The City prohibits parking on all City streets, dead ends and cul-de-sacs after a 1" snowfall. This allows snow crews to clear the streets without the potential for a collision between a parked car and a snowplow or salt truck.

• City snowplows discharge snow from the streets toward the adjacent parkway and driveway, sometimes creating windrows of snow at driveway entrances. It is impossible to prevent this; it is a by-product of our effort to clear streets of snow accumulation in the safest and most efficient manner.

- Residents are prohibited from shoveling snow from their driveways into the street where it can become compact and harden into ice mounds, creating a dangerous safety hazard for motorists and emergency vehicles.
- Residents are asked to keep mailbox doors closed to prevent damage.

• City snow crews try to minimize the mounding of snow around fire hydrants, but plows are designed to discharge snow into the unpaved parkway, making it difficult. Any assistance that homeowners can provide to keep fire hydrants in front of their home visible is greatly appreciated by the City and the Fire Protection Districts serving City residents.



The changing weather poses risks and it's important to be aware of the shifting season and its impact on your surroundings.

#### Fall Driving Safety Tips

A number of weather conditions can contribute to a risky road. Here are a few dangers of fall weather to be aware of when driving:

- Water can pool on dust and oil, making the pavement slippery
- Leaves can make the road slippery and obscure traffic lines, other pavement markings and potholes
- Temperatures can drop dramatically, making ice spots on areas of the road, such as bridges, overpasses and shaded areas
- Fog can limit visibility when driving
- Sun glare is dangerous because it can impact your sight for a few seconds after exposure, obscuring any vision of pedestrians, oncoming traffic and even the car in front of you.

#### **Protect Your Pets**

When it comes to your home, you might think your pet is safe, but there are some hidden dangers. The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) has a helpful list of tips to help keep your pet safe from household poisons, cold weather hazards and everything that could pose a possible threat to your pet, including rodenticides (rat poisons), dangerous wildlife, apple stems, leaves or seeds, and poisonous mushrooms (ingestion could cause health problems).

If your pet ingests something harmful – or is bitten or attacked by a wild animal – call your local animal poison control center or your veterinarian immediately.

#### **Dryer Safety**

Prevent dryer fires by cleaning filters after each load of wash and removing lint that collects in dryer vents. Like burning candles, never leave a load of laundry in the dryer unattended.

## Oakbrook Terrace Private Security Camera Rebate Program

The City of Oakbrook Terrace offers a Private Security Camera Rebate Program for residents of owner-occupied, detached, single-family homes and detached townhomes located within the City where the property is used as the owner's primary residence.

The program provides a rebate of up to \$150 per camera system per residential address. The rebate is exclusively for the cost of the security camera(s) and installation, including any applicable taxes. Rebates will only be given for cameras that are installed on the exterior of the property and for the amount that was paid at the time of application. ## Villa Park Library Card

#### Attention Residents

As of May 1, 2020, the annual fee for a Villa Park library card is \$43 per multi-family household (living in apartments such as Versailles and Regency Place) and \$52 per single-family household (including Spring Club, Berkshire and Arbor 40, as well as all other single-family households) through April 30, 2021. ### Water Bill Payments

The City accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover for payment of water bills. In addition, there are other ways to pay your Oakbrook Terrace water bill: have it debited automatically from your checking account, mail it in, or drop your payment into the convenient drop-box located at the Butterfield Road entrance to City Hall. You can also now pay your water bill over the phone with a credit card by calling. 630-941-8300, ext. 242, or pay online by visiting www.oakbrookterrace.net. If paying by mail, please send it no less than five mailing days before the due date to avoid a penalty for late payment. Please note that water bills are now mailed to residents on a bi-monthly basis. IF YOU ARE MOVING, please call City Hall at 630-941-8300, ext. 242, to schedule a final reading.
