A Message From the Mayor



As we enter the 2018 spring season, the City is working on the 2018-2019 budget, and once again I'm proud to say that we are anticipating another successful year. The City is financially sound with a healthy fund balance and reserves, which I discussed in the last issue of the *Terrace Leaves*.

Water rates in Oakbrook Terrace haven't increased in over three years, and we do not foresee the City raising them anytime in the near future; any increase we incur from the water commission will not be passed on to our residents!

When I took office in 2009, we had one of the highest water rates in the area; now two of our bordering suburbs have higher rates than ours and the other one is just below us. In addition, our water system is newer with fewer repairs required and the system is growing in commercial customers.

The City is anticipating numerous new businesses and restaurants building and opening in 2018-2019, which will generate additional sales and property taxes to keep our City financially secure for many years.

The City will continue to instill that hometown feeling and provide a friendly community by hosting holiday parties and outings for all of our residents and their families. Specifically, the Christmas, Easter, Fourth of July celebration and Halloween festival, as well as the Police National Night Out event.

The City is continuing to put together a policy for each residential homeowner to purchase a security camera for their property to be reimbursed by the City — possibly up to \$150.

We are also looking into purchasing speed alert traffic signs to be installed in numerous locations in our subdivision. These radar-controlled signs are designed to merely indicate the speed of vehicles driving through our City streets and record the vehicle's speed. No citations or any other information will be issued or documented. These items, if obtained and implemented, will be purchased and paid for through the Red Light Camera Enforcement program.

Please be safe and enjoy the spring season.

Scam Artists Claiming to be ComEd Reps

ComEd is warning customers to be on high alert for scam artists claiming to be a ComEd representative seeking payment. Over the past couple of years, the company has seen a significant increase in reports from small businesses and residential customers who were victimized by these types of scam incidents.

Customers should be aware that scammers may call or come to their homes or businesses. Representatives from ComEd always carry proper identification and NEVER ask customers for cash or personal financial information.

Customers can avoid being scammed by taking a few precautions:

- Never provide social security or personal information to anyone initiating contact with you claiming to be a ComEd representative or requesting you to send money to another person or entity other than ComEd.
- Always ask to see a company photo ID before allowing any utility worker into your home or business.
- When in doubt, check it out. Be skeptical of individuals wearing clothing with old or defaced company logos. If you have any doubts, ask to see a company photo ID, and if you are still not sure, call ComEd customer service (1-800-EDISON1) to verify.
- Never make payment for services to anyone coming to the door or someone who is trying to pressure you on the phone.

Anyone who believes he or she has been a target of a phone scam is urged to contact the Illinois Attorney General's office toll free at 1-800-386-5438 (TTY 1-800-964-3013) or visit the Illinois Attorney General's web site at www.illinoisattorneygeneral.gov and click on the link "Protecting Consumers." Customers can reach ComEd at 1-800-EDISON1 to inquire about details on their account or report a possible scam.

 Residents may place brush at curb on the weekend prior to brush pickup day.

To dispose of brush between monthly pickups, use the weekly yard waste program provided by the City's waste hauler, Flood Brothers.

Acceptable Brush

- Tree trimming up to 6 inches in diameter.
- Mounded less than 4 feet high and with ends toward the street.
- Only brush generated by Oakbrook Terrace residents will be accepted.

Public Services

Public Services Highlights December 2017 and January 2018

- Performed extensive maintenance to Buck Trail.
- Came to terms on an agreement with Clarke Mosquito for the City's mosquito abatement initiative.
- Procured, set up, implemented and trained on a new Fuel Management system. (Former was struck by lightning and destroyed.)
- PS Staff assisted at the City's Children's Christmas Party.
- OBT Public Services took part in the State of Illinois' ceremony of raising the new State of Illinois Bi-Centennial flag.
- Public Services Director Craig Ward performed and successfully completed the City's annual Lake Michigan Water Audit accounting for 98% of all water. Amazing.
- All Public Services vehicles underwent a certified safety inspection.
- Installed a new insulating ceiling in the City's water tower control room.
- Snow Events: Public Services handled six snow events in December and eight snow events in January. This resulted in a significant amount of fleet prep and maintenance.
- All Catch Basins were checked and cleaned out for proper drainage of the City's storm sewer system.
- PS Staff attended a J.U.LI.E. training meeting about protecting the underground infrastructure.

- Public Services Director Craig Ward updated the City's water main atlas.
- Public Services Director Craig Ward attended a meeting at the DuPage Water Commission assembled to keep water system management abreast of water system management issues.
- Public Services Director Craig Ward coordinated the replacement of two failing utility poles that were owned by AT&T. They were located at MacArthur/Route 56 and Summit and Morningside.
- A fire flow test was conducted at the Joint Commission.

Call JULIE Before Digging

If you are planting a tree, installing a fence or deck, or doing any other home improvement project that involves digging, remember to call JULIE (811 from a cell phone or 1-800-892-0123) before you begin. JULIE will notify member utility companies to send locators to mark their underground facilities with paint and/or flags. Once you know the approximate location of utility lines, you can dig safely without running the risk of service disruptions, potential injuries, fines and repair costs.

Villa Park Library Card

Effective May 1, 2018, the cost for a Villa Park Library Card is \$42 per multi-family household (living in apartments such as Versailles and Regency Place) and \$51 per single-family household (including Spring Club, Berkshire and Arbor 40, as well as all other single-family households) through April 30, 2019. The library card provides access to all of the library's resources. Applications for Villa Park library cards are available at Oakbrook Terrace City Hall or the Police Department after hours. Water Bill Payments

The City accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover for payment of water bills. In addition, there are other ways to pay your Oakbrook Terrace water bill: have it debited automatically from your checking account, mail it in, or drop your payment into the convenient drop-box located at the Butterfield Road entrance to City Hall. You can also now pay your water bill over the phone with a credit card by calling. 630-941-8300, ext. 242, or pay online by visiting www.oakbrookterrace.net. If paying by mail, please send it no less than five mailing days before the due date to avoid a penalty for late payment.
